The sun is shining, and the trees are budding. Spring is upon us! I hope everyone is getting ready for some genealogy research trips. Now is the time to plan your summer...



#### **Last Meeting Highlights**


What a beautiful day met us for our April member meeting, cooler wind but sunny skies. It was a full house with 25 members and one guest in person and 4 members joining via Zoom.

Our on-site presenter, Scott Norrick from Ancestral Past, shared with us that knowing what happening in the time of our ancestors leads to understanding the they decisions made. Stating that "they were defined and shaped by when and where they lived." He stated, "this is a timely meeting seeing that April 2025 is the 75th anniversary of the 1950 census", and for Michigan he shared some interesting statistics: Detroit held 29% of the state's population (today it's only 6%), one in eleven were immigrants, one in three were born outside the state. Another recipe from the *Auxiliary Favorites II*. This month's feature is from Ruth Carr and she calls this a "Curtain call of the holiday bird": Chicken or Turkey Soup.

Remove meat from carcass of chicken, turkey, or duck and set aside. Crack bones. Place the bones in kettle, add skin, several stalks of celery, 1 carrot, 1 onion, 6 peppercorns, tip of 1 bay leaf, 4 cloves.

Cover with water. Simmer 2 hr. cool slightly, strain. Return meat to stock, Chill, skim off fat. Add salt to taste. Simmer 15 min.

Ruth Joanne (Ryke) Carr was born on April 30, 1936 to Dutch immigrant parents John and Henrietta (DenOtter) Ryke – yes from Muskegon's own famous family bakery "Ryke's". She was the youngest of six children in which her oldest sister was 19 years her senior.

I personally knew her older sister Betty, through our church affiliation, who told me during one conversation that all the children put in their time at the bakery – whether it was helping to mix the frosting or sweep the floors. It was truly a family business. I believe this would have been no different for little Ruth while she was growing up as well.

On June 4, 1955 (per her obituary) she married the "love of her life" Robert Carr – to which they were married 65 happy years! This union was blessed with the birth of two sons.

At one point in their marriage they owned and operated a Floral and gift shop called Bob Carr's House of Gifts out on Holton Road.

Ruth passed away January 7, 2021 at the age of 84 years old.


