
### President's Message

### ALLEN COUNTY LIBRARY - FORT WAYNE, IN

Re-opening by Curt B. Witcher

As you read this, the Genealogy Center is days away from reopening for the public to use our physical collection and onsite databases again. On Monday, July 6, 2020, we will reopen our doors to our customers at 9 a.m. and resume our regular schedule of hours. We are so happy to be able to welcome you back to your facility--back to your home for family history discoveries--back to the place where you come to find your stories.

Like so many things in our lives right now, the reopened Genealogy Center will look significantly different in a number of ways. Our primary concern is for the health and safety of our colleagues and our customers as you discover anew the sources in our Center for finding your families' stories. Toward that end, there is a lot of physical distancing that has been put in place. All our public computer stations are spaced out by at least six feet; the chairs at our research tables are physically distanced by at least six feet; and we are asking that customers and staff remain physically distanced as much as possible.

Plexiglas shields have been installed at our service points that make us look a bit more like bank tellers than traditional librarians. Our library board of trustees is requiring all staff and all customers to wear face masks while in our buildings—that will be a different look as well. Plastic keyboard and mouse covers will be available for customers to use as well as hand sanitizer and cleaning agents. Our spaces will be cleaned regularly throughout each day. All we want you to catch while you're with us is a renewed passion for finding your families' stories!





# Ancestry Security Team Confident Family Tree Maker Vulnerability Has Not Impacted Ancestry's Systems

The following is an announcement from Ancestry.com:

"We have been alerted to a potential security vulnerability at the MacKiev Company, which owns Family Tree Maker software. While we no longer have formal affiliation with the company, Family Tree Maker is used by some Ancestry customers to sync family trees between Family Tree Maker software and Ancestry. Based on our investigation, we do not believe that any Ancestry systems or data have been compromised. The Ancestry-Family Tree Maker sync uses OAuth2, a widely- used authentication protocol to provide Family Tree Maker permission to access Ancestry resources without exposing user passwords.

"As a best practice, we recommend Ancestry customers who have used their Ancestry credentials to access Family Tree Maker software change their password and enable two-factor authentication."

#### New and Updated At a Glance Guides

The At a Glance guides are published by the Genealogical Publishing Company. Meant to be quick-read references, the guides are four-page laminates, 8 x 11 in size, authored by experts on specific topics. There is a wide range of guides available at the GPC website. Here are brief descriptions of some updated guides newly published in 2020.

### German Genealogy Research, Updated Edition

by Ernest Thode

There are segments on German history followed by sections on research tips:

- German Emigration, including the reasons for leaving homelands and the eras of peak migrations:
- Passenger Lists, including lists of websites and German archives where online lists may be found;
- Unlocking German Family History, including background and online sources related to German places, surnames, given names, and dates, the most noble being a description and link to the ever-valuable Meyers Gazetteer;
- German Record Sources, including information about and where to find church and civil registration records, the German Center for Genealogy which has Germany's largest genealogical collection, the Berlin Document Center which documents the regime from 1920 to 1945, village heritage books and histories that list village residents, military archives, censuses, and references for further reading;

Other Online Resources, including additional website URLs for finding German information.

### Scottish Genealogy Research, Updated Edition

- .There are segments on Scottish history followed by sections on research tips:
- Scottish Emigration Background, including migration information and references for further research;

- Passenger Lists, of which there are few before the mid-19th century, but there are pointers to some resources;
- Unlocking Scottish Family History, with information on surnames and palaeography, the study of old handwriting styles and deciphering old documents:
- Basic Genealogical Sources, including descriptions of old parish registers of the Church of Scotland 1553 to 1854 and other church records, post 1854 statutory registration of births, marriages, deaths, divorces, civil partnerships and samesex marriages, and census returns from 1842 to 1911:
- Supplementary Record Sources, describing sources for wills and testaments, monumental inscription lists, Kirk Session Records, Services of Heirs, Property and the Register of Sasines, burgh records, estate and family papers, maritime records, and tax records.
- Major Online Resources describes websites useful for further research.

### Polish Genealogy Research, Updated Edition by Rosemary A. Dembinski Chorzempa. There are segments on Polish history and research tips:

- Polish Names describes the complications of deciphering the surnames;
- Polish History and Emigration describes brief history from 963 A.D. to present;
- Finding the Hometown is a brief guide to locating an ancestral village of origin;
- Online Databases from Poland offers updated information on new efforts posting Polish records online;
- Other Resources includes details about the millions of Polish and U.S. records at FamlySearch;
- Areas in Polish Lands is a full page of major place names in Polish, Latin, German, and English language, a reminder of the variety of sovereigns and kingdoms that once ruled Poland and produced a mix of record languages.

Small as they are, these are very worthwhile references rich in resource and research ideas. ### You Can Help Nazi Victims' Families Learn Their Fates in Online Archive Project

"Thousands answer crowdsourcing call to assist Germany's Arolsen Archives in making 26 million newly digitized historical documents searchable by anyone online.

"A huge crowdsourcing project to memorialize the victims of Nazi persecution is bringing together thousands of volunteers from across the globe who are locked down during the international coronavirus crisis. The "Every Name Counts" project, based out of Germany's Arolsen Archives (formerly the International Tracing Service), aims to make 26 million recently digitized primary historical records searchable."

"It was a perfect opportunity to harness the interest and energy of a global community of volunteers to assist in advancing the archive's new mission to make its holdings available to researchers, and more importantly to family members wanting to find out exactly what happened to their loved ones during and immediately after the war.

"While part of the archives became available online to the public in May 2019, crowdsourcing is a new approach for the Arolsen Archives. Before the pandemic, it had used only outside companies, artificial intelligence, and its own staff to do the indexing.
