MARKING TIME #familyhistorymonth

This time of year, the news reports swirl around the election candidates. All types of media seem to have room for little else. October is Family History month, as you know, and we can be the voice of the expert in our areas of influence. I think this is a great time to use it. More Family, Less Politics!

Cemeteries and monuments are just one part of family history, but we know how important they are to individuals and to our communities. Now, there are as many opinions about cemeteries as there are about politics, but we can't let that stop us from speaking about the importance of all aspects of genealogy. In my articles, I try to look back on how things have been done in the past and what changes have been made over time.

With the topic of family history, what comes to mind is how a cemetery is no longer a main source of family record keeping. We know that at one time, the names, dates, and relationships inscribed on stones, would give us a timeline of family lineage. It was as important as the family bible records. I still find the most enjoyment at discovering old family plots with the magnificent family stone in the center and a dozen small markers surrounding it. It is fun to piece together the family tree according to dates and to wonder who they were and how they lived. My own family plots at Maplewood in Lamont are all in a row and I love walking down the line remembering each person or the tales I was told about someone. In fact, in that cemetery, I am related to almost everyone by either birth or marriage!

What we have now is good access to old paperwork and modern ways to keep clear records. I am thankful for those things. But I think there is a public idea, that because someone else is keeping records, and they can be easily accessed if needed, that there is not much reason beyond hobby for keeping copies of records. I think less and less people see the need for writing out the old stories that have been told by the grandparents, or for marking a grave if there even is a burial.

We know the value. We know that family history provides a sense of belonging. It keeps us grounded and teaches us to define what is important in our lifetime. We know all the good and bad stories need to be told and passed down and that the faded, wrinkled pictures are a sweet tie to our roots.

I want to encourage you, for the month of October, to share your family history.

Here are some suggestions:

- 1. Post to Social Media:
 - Share old pictures of your family. Use a hashtag #familyhistorymonth #familyhistory #genealogy #muskegon

(whatever town applies to your family history) Hashtags are a way for people to search topics. You are adding to a conversation when you use one

- 2. Write out a family story or two and mail those out to some family members. Start it off with "I remember when your grandma told me ... ". Wouldn't we all love to have received something like that?
- 3. Post pictures of your family plots or monuments in cemeteries. Try a selfie in the Cemetery! Encourage others to visit their own and take a family photo. Make it positive.



4. Organize a walk for your family or group of friends to a cemetery. Play detective with a goal to find the oldest family plot on the grounds.

Sharing your family history is important to your family and to our communities. Let's encourage others to share about their family history too. Our combined lives tell the stories of our towns. It tells us about the struggles and the joys of life. We can't make everyone fall in love with genealogy, but we can inspire them to get curious. Happy Family History Month!

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
