Last Meeting Highlights



Meet your Board...

Jim Harkness

My name is Jim Harkness. I was born in Muskegon at Hackley Hospital, the middle child (#4) of 7 children to my parents Richard and Elaine (Allen) Harkness. I became interested in genealogy while serving in the U.S. Navy, living on an aircraft carrier. After talking to my father and mother about where we came from there were more questions than answers. Both of father's parents died very young before I was born, and I saw little of my mother's parents as they separated and divorced when my mother was a child during the Great Depression. Anyway, I had some spare time at sea, so I started to write away (snail mail by air mail) for records various relatives, historical societies, county clerks and state governments. This was in the 1970's prior to the computer age when things moved more slowly, except for the jets onboard! I was

hooked.

I'm a member of the MCGS Board as a Member "At Large," and I am also working on military stories for the MCGS History Book 2 project nearing completion. I have been a member of the MCGS since about 2010. Because of my military experience I have a particular interest in how military service impacts families and in family trees.

When not doing Board stuff I am researching the following surnames: Harkness, Golwitzer, Allen, Hanson, Nicholson, Wood, Cruikshank, Severson, and Nelson along with a host of others. My heritage lies Ireland/Scotland (father's paternal), Germany (father's maternal), English (mother's paternal), and Norway/Sweden (mother's maternal). I have been lucky to have completed tracing 3 of my 4 lines at least back to country of origin overseas (still working on the Allen line in Kentucky in the early 1800's!).

There continue to be research surprises in my family tree periodically, but my first one was also one of the most

memorable to me. When I first started tracing back the line, surprised to find out that the earliest Harkness ancestors in Muskegon County came here in about 1849 and were farmers at first, but later the father (my 2nd grandfather) and sons worked as lumbermen on the Muskegon River for the Muskegon **Booming** Company. The stories they could tell if only I could interview them today! Even my father was unaware of this history.

When not doing genealogy work, I am sleeping or eating kidding). Other interests include playing ice hockey in a recreation league (which I had to give up 2 years ago due to not being able to keep up with the youngsters), hunting and camping at the family cabin "up north," walking for exercise and stress relief, and periodic trips to visit four grown children and nine grandchildren in IL, VA and NC.

Evergreen Cemetery Mystery Solved

Here is the story I've
pieced together. All
documents are logged in
Ancestry in a family tree
that may be shared with
anyone interested.

Johan Peter Näsberg was born on Nov. 9, 1851, in the north of Sweden. He married Erika C. Lundgren on Sept. 5, 1875. Their first four children were born in Sweden, 1 boy and 3 girls.

August 10, 1874 – Isak John Theodor Näsberg was born.

Sept. 5, 1875 – Johan and Erika were married in Ljustorp, Västernorrland, Sweden.

April 4, 1876 – daughter Märta was born.

Jan. 18, 1878 – daughter Hulda was born.

Sometime in 1878, Johan departed from Timrå in Västernorrland (West Northland), Sverige (Sweden) and emigrated to Quebec, Canada at age 27 arriving on Sept. 19, 1879. He was probably scouting for a location to move his family to North

America. He must have returned because he was with the family when they emigrated from Sweden in 1881. In 1879, Johan's brother Oscar also moved to Muskegon and then settled in Cadillac, Michigan.

Jan. 22, 1880 – daughter Selma was born in Timrå.

On June 20, 1881, the family left their home in Sörberge (a village in Timrå) in Västernorrland, Sverige (Swedish for Sweden). {By the time they left Sweden, Erika had 3 siblings and 9 half-siblings. Her mother had passed away in 1854 when Erika was only 2 years old, and her father had remarried.} On the ship manifest, the family was listed as Johan Peter Näsberg, Erika Lundgren (maiden name) Näsberg, Isak John Theodor Johansson (meaning Johan's son) Näsberg, Märta Johanna Johansdotter (meaning Johan's daughter) Näsberg, Hulda Kristina Johansdotter Näsberg, and Selma Erika Johansdotter Näsberg. They sailed from Goteborg, Sweden to Hull, England aboard the ship Romeo. They sailed on to New York, finally settling in Muskegon where Johan was a laborer.

Jan. 22, 1882 - daughter

Dive Into Muskegon

Märta (Martha) Johanna passed away from typhoid fever at age 5 and is buried in Evergreen Cemetery.

August 31, 1882 – son Oscar August was born in Muskegon.

Dec. 20, 1882 – daughter Selma passed away from pneumonia at age 2. Burial location unknown.

1883 records - The family lived on Erickson St north of Sumner Street.

July 22, 1884 – daughter Frieda Caroline was born.

Sept. 5, 1886 – possibly a son, Charles Axel, was born and died. He is buried by the parents in Oakwood Cemetery in Muskegon, MI. I could not find a birth record.

August 15, 1887 – son Richard Earnest was born.

April 30, 1890 – Johan died at the age of 38. Surviving children were John Isak (16), Hulda (12), Oscar (age 8), Frieda (6), and Richard Ernest (3). Johan is buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Muskegon.

What happened to the family after the death of Johan...
