Evergreen Cemetery Mystery Solved

Here the story continues
after the death of Johan:

Erika remarried on May 7, 1892, to Peter O. Olson from Dalton Township. His wife had passed away in 1890 as well. Peter O. Olson was a farmer in Dalton Township and was also from Sweden. In Swedish his name was Per Olof Nordin. Olson is from his father's name Olof to Olsson (Olof's son) then shortened to Olson. He had arrived in Grand Haven in August of 1879 from Sweden.

On July 21, 1892, Johan's brother Oscar Peterson (he had taken the last name of Peterson from his father Per's name (Peter in English), Peterson = Peter's son) married Alma Anderson in Cadillac, Michigan. They have four children of their own and later help to oversee care for Johan's children.

On March 3, 1893, Erika passed away at the age of 40. She had been a

dressmaker in Muskegon. Surviving children were John Isak (19), Hulda (15), Oscar (11), Frieda (9), and Richard Ernest (6).

Peter Olson remarried the next year on May 12, 1894, to Jenni Larson from Bergen, Norway. It appears that the children did not stay with him. He passed away on Jan. 31, 1918.

An 1894 record notes John (Isak at age 19) and Freida (age 9) living in Muskegon, not with Peter. Perhaps John took on a parental role and the children stayed in the home on Erickson Street. Probably close to 1900, John (Isak) decided to move to Munising, Michigan in the Upper Peninsula to work as a log scaler. Richard was listed in the 1900 census as living with his uncle Oscar in Cadillac.

Muskegon Court records note that on March 14, 1900, the children's uncle, Oscar L. Peterson, who lived in Cadillac, requested that the court appoint Mr. Charles Jacobson, who worked as a salesman in a clothing store in Muskegon, as guardian of Oscar (age 17), Freida (age 16), and Richard Ernest (age 13). At the time, Oscar Peterson had two children of his own. Charles was married

to Hilma, they had 4 children (ages 16, 11, 8 and 6), and they lived at 239 Washington Avenue Muskegon (house no longer there). A difficult decision was presumably made on how to move forward in the best interests of the orphaned children. Later court records show that Charles was renting the Nesberg home on Erickson St. on behalf of the estate, so the children may have lived with him.

Sep. 25, 1901, eldest son John (Isak) Theodor married Selma Carlson in Munising, Michigan. She was born in Sweden, and they had nine children. He was a "cedar maker" in the lumber industry and later a night watchman at a papermill. **Following** Selma's death in 1946, John lived with his daughter Evelyn in Troy, MI. He passed away on March 9, 1969, at the age of 94 and was buried in Munising, MI.

The rest of the story will remain a mystery until the December issue of Twig Talk, where the story will conclude.
