

The conclusion of... Evergreen Cemetery Mystery Solved

July 24, 1903, court records show a 3-year insurance policy was taken out on the property at 71 Erickson St (no longer a viable address) in Muskegon for \$550. Charles E. Jacobson remained guardian of minor children Oscar (now 20), Freida (19), and Richard Ernest (16). It was noted that he paid \$3 for a pair of shoes for Freida, sums for repairs for the house, property taxes of \$25.07 for 3 years (1898 through 1900), and he was collecting rent for the house on behalf of the estate. The outside of the house was painted at a cost of \$35.

1907 - Richard Ernest, then 19, was a deck hand on the ship Naomi (formerly the SS Wisconsin). The ship had rescued the crew of the John V. Moran on Feb. 9, 1899, and was one of the first with a double hull. A young man's work dream to on. Unfortunately, on May 21, 1907, there was a fire on the Naomi in Lake Michigan, and Richard Earnest was killed from sustaining burns. He was buried on May 22nd in Oakwood Cemetery in Muskegon.

The 1,181-gross registered ton steel-hulled screw steamer burned on Lake Michigan 28 nautical miles (52km; 32mi) west of Grand Haven, Michigan, a total loss, with the loss of five lives. 86 survivors were rescued by the Kansas.

From Mlive: Lookback: Steamer Naomi stuck in Lake Michigan ice...: On May 21, 1907, just over two years after her passengers trekked to shore [after the ship was stuck in ice four miles off the Muskegon Piers], a deadly fire swept through her wooden superstructure killing four of her crew and fatally injuring one passenger. Many believe the fire was started by rats chewing on a large shipment of matches stored next to an open barrel of oil.


The Naomi was towed to Grand Haven and eventually moved to the Manitowoc Dry Dock in Wisconsin for repairs. <u>Click here</u> to see a photo of the ship and to read more about the history of the Naomi (originally the Wisconsin). The owner of the Naomi at the time was Captain Edward G. Crosby, who had named the ship after his daughter. Captain *Crosby perished in the sinking of the* Titanic on April 15, 1912, with his wife and daughter surviving. Accounts differ when the Naomi was renamed as the E.G. Crosby -- either by 1910 or after Captain Crosby was lost on the Titanic. After serving in World War I as The General Robert M. O'Reilly, the ship was renamed Pilgrim. In 1924, she was returned to her original owners and given back her original name of Wisconsin. The Wisconsin sunk off the coast of Kenosha, Wisconsin in 1929. The wreck was discovered in 1963 and is now a popular dive site.

On July 5, 1907, Oscar was living in Chicago and filed papers in Muskegon releasing Mr. Jacobson from the guardianship.

Dive Into Muskegon

> Freida did the same while living in Muskegon. I suspect that Hulda had moved to Chicago, and Oscar and Freida followed her at some point, because... In 1910 – After the death of her mother, I could not find records for Hulda in Muskegon. She does show up in a 1910 Census in Knox, Illinois, as a servant in the Swank family household. No further records of Hulda were found. At the age of 26, Frieda married Charles Thompson in Chicago, Illinois on Oct. 19, 1910. They had a daughter Clara. Frieda was widowed in 1944, lived to the age of 86 and passed on Oct. 12, 1970, in Evanston, IL where she is buried. On June 7, 1917, Charles Jacobson, the guardian, passed away at the age of 55 in Muskegon and is buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Muskegon with his family. 1918 - At age 37, Oscar registered for the World War I draft on Sept. 12, 1918. He stated he was a night cook at Oakwood's Hotel, 7086 S. Chicago Ave., Chicago, IL where he also lived. He passed away on Sept. 24, 1919, just a year later and is buried in Memorial Park Cemetery in Skokie, IL.
