Last Meeting Highlights

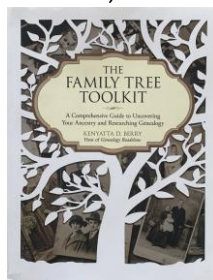

Technology Merges with Genealogy

So, last month I wrote about how [Ancestor Seekers](#) helped me go back to the 1670s with my German Immigrant's family line. This month I wanted to share with you the website that helped us do it. It's called [Archion](#).

This is a paid site, with subscriptions starting from \$23 (30 days with 50 downloads) to one-full year, and I just received an article from [Ancestral Past](#) titled, "Archion – A Great Resource for German Ancestry Research" as part of their July-August Newsletter. It states that prior to 1871 ALL primary records of important family events were kept by the local churches.

It goes on to describe the value of the site with its 175,000 German Church Books available online for viewing and downloading and are adding more **daily**.

There is one downfall to this site that I will mention: THERE IS NO INDEX FOR SEARCHING BY SURNAME. But don't let that stop you, this is an amazing site if you have a German brick wall you are hoping to break down.

AND, I believe, this website is available for free at any Family Search Center around the country (our closest one is located at 2780 Leonard St NE, Grand Rapids, MI 49525 (720) 987-6403. Their hours are Tuesdays 10 – 2 or by appointment.

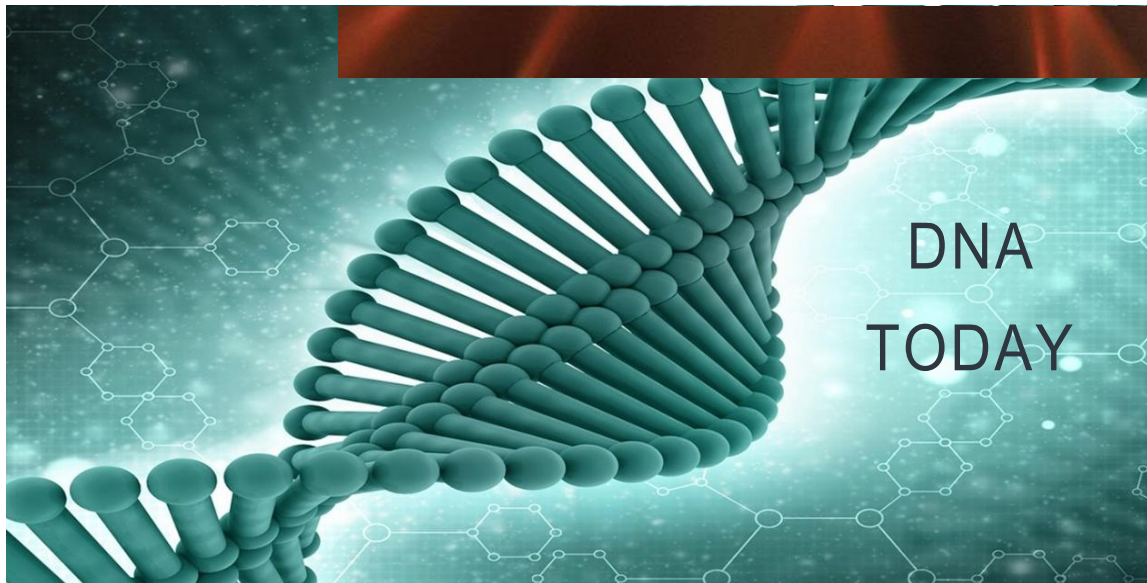
Back to the old time recipes from the *Auxiliary Favorites II*.

June 13, 1945 Miss Marjean Elizabeth DeWind became Mrs. Elvie Victor Borgerding, marrying a WWII Purple Heart honored soldier. Born April 1, 1923 she was the fourth of five children born to Henry and Margaret (Alger) DeWind. In the 54 years of marriage, five children were born but it was only after her children were reared that Marjean went to work as an Executive Secretary for Christian Care Convalescent Home until her retirement in 1998. Unfortunately, she shared only a short amount of retirement time with Elvie who passed away in February of 1999. Marjean lived another 6 years until her passing in 2005. Ms. Marjean contributed several recipes to our Auxiliary Favorites, here is just one of them...

Graham Bread or Muffins

1 c flour
½ tsp salt
4 tsp baking powder
½ c brown sugar (packed)
1 c graham crackers crumbs
2 eggs, beaten
1 c milk
1/3 c melted shortening
Nuts or raisins, if desired

Sift dry ingredients together. Add sugar and cracker crumbs. Add eggs mixed with milk and shortening. Add nuts or raisins. For muffins, bake 15 minutes at 425*; for bread, bake 1 hours at 350*



DNA TODAY

There is news for the Genetic Community...

MyHeritage has announced that they will no longer allow uploading of one's DNA from another company to their site. They are joining the ranks of Ancestry.com and 23andMe where you will have to purchase a test kit from them in order to have results. If you have already uploaded your results from another testing company to MyHeritage, I do not believe anything will change.

Diahan Southard (from YourDNAGuide.com) is asking MyHeritage to be open up to the possibility of having a DNA only membership option (similar to what Ancestry.com currently has available) for those not interested in having access to the record collections.

This change became effective August 1.

The going cost of a DNA kit from MyHeritage varies, but I have seen it as low as \$29.00. So, watch the sales, sign up for their email notifications and enjoy the benefits.

It is recommended to actually have your DNA tested at more than one company – because no one knows what the future may bring.



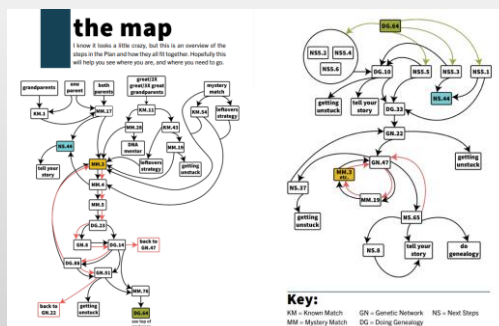
